Upper School Development

This study is currently underway and the findings still have to be written up. We hope to have a report available by the end of the term, so that we can share our findings and any proposals with you at that time.

Birch Class

At the beginning of term, Birch class continued learning about building. They had previously looked at primitive structures and the necessity of shelter. This time, however, we studied the truly impressive and complex structures that human hands are capable of building. Connecting to our Local History lessons the children saw that the grandest buildings in Norwich are either royal or religious and so we looked at design structures of sacred spaces around the world and the difficult task of the Mason.

Understanding the hard work involved in making such elaborate structures shows the children the motivation and capability of the crafts person, as well as the possibility of what humans are able to achieve. Over the last few weeks Birch class have been learning about the human being and the animal world, which began with a detailed study of the human head and hands – the taking in and giving back to the world. This has been great for the children to look at the specialisation of different animals and again, at just how many varied things the human hands can do.

Elder Class

In a few weeks time, Elder class will be going to Michael Hall School in Sussex to take part in the Olympics, along with all the other Class 5 children of Waldorf schools throughout the UK. This will be quite and adventure for the children as they pitch camp, meet new faces and share and experience of javelin, discus, 50m dash, high jump, wrestling and marathon (1 mile). As the children get to grips with the different gestures required for these disciplines, they are encouraged to work towards grace as well as distance, appreciation of each others' efforts as well as their own and improving their own performance rather than comparing themselves to their peers.

Elder are also preparing a play focusing on the myths of Pandora and Orpheus, having worked with various stories from Greek Mythology throughout the last term.
